Course Title: MEDIEVAL INDIA (1206-1605.AD) BASHTCS - 301

6 HRS PER WEEK MARK-20+80=100 CREDITS - 5

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course explores the history of Medieval India, spanning from the establishment of the Delhi Sultanate in 1206 to the dawn of the Mughal Empire in 1605.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

- 1. Understand the major political, social, and cultural developments in Medieval India.
- 2. Analyse the impact of Islamic rule on Indian society and culture.
- 3. Examine the role of Sufism and Bhakti movements in shaping Medieval Indian thought and culture.
- 4. Evaluate the significance of the Delhi Sultanate and the Mughal Empire in Indian history.

COURSE OUTCOMES

- 1. Students will be equipped with the detailed knowledge on Indian feudalism, impact of Islam on Indian society and culture during medieval time.

- 2. Analyse the impact of European trading companies on Indian economy and politics.
- 3. Examine the expansion of British rule in India and the consequences of colonialism.
- 4. Evaluate the social, cultural, and economic changes that occurred during this period.

COURSE OUTCOMES

- Students will learn how the regional powers became strong in India after the downfall of the Mughal Empire and in the course of time how the British East India Company became absolute power in India.
- 2. They can understand about the colonial nature of state during 200 years rule of the British power in this land.
- 3. They can gather knowledge about how the Indian society, politics, religion and economy had changed during the Company's rule in India.
- **4.** They will understand how the company's economic exploitation made Indian sentiments to rise against the British rule. That ultimately paved the background of the Great Revolt of 1857.
